- 1. The award proceeds from the premise that the physician's role as guardian of health and welfare of infants and children and even of those yet unborn is not limited to preventive and curative medicine but extends to the continuing concern he or she should have for them as human beings entitled to the affection, care and protection of society and of the state. This responsibility of the physicians is most effectively exercised in collaboration with his colleagues in the medical profession banded together in component societies as child advocates.
- 2. As an organized group of child advocates, the component society may undertake activities of the following nature:
 - a. Education of the community in the health care of children and in active respect of their rights.
 - b. Work for the passage of national legislation and local ordinances for the promotion and protection of the child's right to health
 - c. Publication of articles, pamphlets, books, and other literature bearing on child advocacy
 - d. Measures for the prevention of child abuse in the community and the prosecution of the individuals and public officials responsible thereof
 - e. Institutional care for rehabilitation of abused children and of those improperly cared for by their parents
 - f. Measures taken to protect the youth against drug abuse or to protect children from addicted parents or guardians
 - g. Provision of recreational, hobby or library facilities for children as well as guidance, counseling in the premises
 - h. Coordination and collaboration with religious and civic organizations or authorities in the interest of child advocacy.
 - i. Other activities in the area of child advocacy

11. Kalusugan at Kaunlaran ng mga Katutubo Award

(Kultura, Komunikasyon at Katutubong Wika para sa Pagpapalaganap ng Karunungang Pangkalusugan) **(KKK)**

- A health literacy, community upliftment and development program for the indigenous communities

(initiated by Prof. Maria Minerva Patawaran-Calimag)

Definition:

Health Literacy - is the degree to which individuals have the capacity to obtain, comprehend, utilize and process basic health information and services needed to make appropriate health decisions across the three (3) domains of the health continuum: Health care, disease prevention, and health promotion.

Goal: Provide an affirmative, easily accessible, and concrete educational and community-based programs designed to improve the health status and quality of life of the indigenous communities.

Keywords: Sustainable, long term, simple, patient-centered, partnership/collaboration, community empowerment, preventive and promotive health, Universal Health Care

Objectives:

Programs and Projects targeted towards indigenous communities are intended to:

- 1. Improve access to healthcare: The project should aim to increase the availability and accessibility of healthcare services specifically tailored to address the health concerns of indigenous communities.
- 2. Raise awareness about preventive care: The project should focus on educating indigenous communities about preventive healthcare measures and practices. This includes raising awareness about the importance of regular check-ups, vaccinations, and hygiene practices to prevent the spread of diseases and improve overall health.
- 3. Address specific health challenges: Indigenous communities often face unique health challenges that require tailored interventions. The project should identify and address these challenges, such as addressing specific diseases prevalent in indigenous communities, addressing environmental health concerns, and addressing mental health issues arising from cultural, social, or historical factors.
- 4. Empowering community members: The project should aim to empower indigenous community members to take charge of their own health. This can be achieved through capacity-building initiatives, such as training community health workers, providing health education materials in local languages, and involving community members in decision-making processes related to healthcare.
- 5. Foster cultural sensitivity and respect: The project should prioritize cultural sensitivity and respect for indigenous cultures and practices. This includes involving indigenous community leaders and traditional healers in the project's planning and implementation, incorporating traditional healing practices into healthcare services, and ensuring that healthcare providers are trained to respect and understand indigenous cultural norms and beliefs.
- 6. Enhance collaboration and partnerships: The project should foster collaboration between indigenous communities, healthcare providers, government agencies, and non-governmental organizations. This collaboration can facilitate information sharing, resource pooling, and coordinated efforts to address the health concerns of indigenous communities effectively.
- 7. Monitor and evaluate impact: The project should establish monitoring and evaluation mechanisms to assess the impact of interventions on the health outcomes of indigenous communities. Regular evaluation allows for identifying successes, areas for improvement, and adjusting strategies accordingly to ensure the project's effectiveness and sustainability.
